Vancouver gives away ashtrays

This spring and summer smokers in Vancouver, Canada will have an easier time supporting the city's cigarette butt recycling program that was launched in 2013. Pliable pocket ashtrays are being given away this season as a way of getting smokers to treat butts as a valuable resource rather than a thoughtless castoff. An initial purchase of 6,000 snap-closing, pouch-style ashtrays was made at a cost of \$4,500. Last year the city tried a hard plastic version, but found it too bulky for the user. Vancouver has recycled 1.2 million butts in six years.

Beer company initiates search for New York marathon runners

In partnership with Keep America Beautiful, Michelob ULTRA has 95 coveted spots up for grabs for people wishing to run in the TCS New York City Marathon on Team Ultra. But there's a catch. To qualify, they have to prove they are environmentalists and they must work "plogging" into their exercise routines. Plogging defines a craze that first emerged in Sweden in February 2018. Rivers are "plastic highways"

New research from UK charity Canal & River Trust shows that half a million items of plastic reach the oceans from canals and rivers every year. The group describes canals and rivers as "plastic highways to the sea" and wants visitors to the southwest in Wales to lead in achieving plastic-free waterways. If each of the 32 million visitors to the region removed one piece of plastic litter from the waters and disposed of it correctly the problem could be solved in one year, the charity estimated.

Famous Chinese blogger Zheng Jiayi faked a litter clean up to garner attention for herself on Wednesday, World Environment Day. She spread litter from public bins around her and then posted photos of herself and four full bags. After admitting to her hoax she said it was "reverse marketing".
