Residents use technology

In Chennai, India a mix of CCTV cameras, smart phones, loudspeakers, a mobile app and connectivity all factor into the high-tech solution that residents of Bhai Garden invented to reduce littering. The system, which talks to people while filming them in the act of littering, embarrasses them into correcting themselves.

Big grocer to ditch plastic bags

Grocery chain Sobeys announced an end to its use of plastic bags at checkout counters across Canada by January 31. The company, which says it distributes 225 million carrier bags to customers each year in its 1500+ stores, will switch to paper bags in 2020. The nation's second-largest grocer, it will encourage the use of reusable bags too. The first supermarket giant in Canada to ditch plastic bags, Sobeys may offer preferential parking spaces to customers who bring their own bags, according to one report. When littered, plastic bags are a menace to wildlife on land and in the water. Thrown in the garbage, plastic occupies valuable landfill space as a contaminant.

No more plastic, it's BYO H20 at SFO

As of August 20, water in disposal bottles will be banned from San Francisco Airport as part of its goal to be the first zero waste airport by 2021. No tenant, vendor or vending machine there will be allowed to proffer water in single-use plastic bottles. They can still purvey it in glass, aluminum or certified compostable containers. Travelers may bring empty plastic disposables to refill at 100 airport filling stations. But unopened, single use water bottles will be barred from SFO by security.
