### UK Litter Inquiry weighs in

British MPs want a portion of tobacco taxes diverted to local butt litter cleanup. A report from a Commons committee also advocates for disposal instructions on all product packaging, clean storefront laws for takeaway restaurants and fines higher than the current £80. Released yesterday, the nationwide report stops short of calling for a chewing gum tax and instead issues a final warning to gum manufacturers to fund cleanup solutions. Tobacco makers should be required to supply portable ashtrays to retailers to hand out to smokers, the report says, noting litter in Britain has risen by 20% in the past 12 years.

# DID YOU KNOW?

In Grantham, UK the amount of litter collected in a year across the 365 square miles covering South Kesteven District weighs 1,700 tonnes. That's the weight of 225 double-decker buses.

## A 'CORE' ISSUE IN CANTERBURY

Canterbury has taken its litter awareness show to the streets. The fanciful campaign has people dressing up like apple cores and pop cans to highlight the range of litter found tossed aside. Plenty of genuine bagged litter also sits on display to showcase the work required to gather remnant garbage caused by wilful litterers. Now may the best time to put to rest the idea that dropped apple cores and banana peels are "biodegradable" and should not count as litter. A strewn banana skin will languish and rot for about two years before it "disappears". Organic material such as unwanted food or peelings can enjoy a new life as compost when placed in the requisite bin. Discarded incorrectly, there's no other word for it but the L-word.

A new Swiss study compares the carbon footprints of wasted food (meat, deli, cheese, dairy, fruits & vegetables). It tracked six stores in a supermarket chain from 2010-12. They wasted 1,570 tonnes or 87 tonnes per store annually. Fruits and vegetables made up 85% of the waste, but only 46% of the total footprint from production, processing and transportation. Meat was 3.5% waste, but devoured 28% of footprint.
