Container deposit scheme is a definite 'go' for New South Wales



Long fought for and awaited, a May 8 NSW government announcement gives the green light to a container deposit scheme. It came after a fierce, multi-year lobby driven by environmental groups like Boomerang Alliance and Greenpeace. Environment minister Mark Speakman told 2UE Weekend Afternoon show that a plan will be brought to fruition by July 2017. It will be based on a simple idea - return an empty container, receive 10 cents. An advisory panel will recommend how the program should be set up. Premier Mike Baird campaigned on reducing litter by 40 per cent by 2020 in NSW, where 160 million containers are littered out of four billion distributed each year.

Girl, 3, inspires community turnaround Mathilda Rusby is only three, but the toddler is teaching adults a thing or two. Her parents posted photos of the girl picking up litter on social media. The images caught the eyes of authorities in North Tyneside, who responded by installing more bins and posting warning signs. A short YouTube piece quotes a neighbour: "She's three and she already knows that littering is wrong, whereas people who are fully grown adults don't know."

Until July 21, Hubbub Inc. has a rubbish shop open in Colford, a clever stunt to highlight litter levels in the Forest of Dean. Shelves display "locally sourced litter", some of it 33 years old, found in the forest.

#### Trees on watch for littering in Forest of Dean

School children will design faces to be painted on 100 trees in Forest Dean - the newest way to deter littering, according to Hubbub, a charity innovating responses to the problem. In Rotterdam, 10,000 eyes were painted on public buildings and crime dropped noticeably. Research hints that seeing the image of eyes makes people feel like they are being watched and makes them less inclined to break rules. This latest scientific theory is driving the program to put eyes on the trees. It is believed that littering will decrease. The local council spends £400,000 a year to haul 250 tonnes of litter out of the forest.

#### Fines go up in Christchurch, NZ (5/12)

The maximum littering fine in Christchurch has changed for the first time since 1991, quadrupling to \$400. **Garbage trucks bear a hard-hitting slogan** (5/14) Savannah, Georgia wrapped ten garbage trucks with a billboard-sized message against littering: "There's a word for people who litter: criminal."

List reveals who's raking in the most fines (5/9)The list of the ten highest litter-fining cities in Britain is out. Accordingly, people who litter should steer clear of Enfield. The London suburb was the top fine-charger over the past five years, at £1.5 million. The national average for fines is £10,000 per council 2010 to 2015.
