Costa Rica moves to protect more coastline

In step with the recent <u>UN Oceans Conference</u> Costa Rica <u>announced</u> a significant expansion of its protected coastal areas. Adding Cabo Blanco, 800 sq. km. in the Nicoya Gulf, increases the country's share of seas under conservation to 15.7% from 12.7%.

Seeking a global ban on single use plastic

#CleanSeas, UN Environment's pushback against ocean plastic contamination, calls for plastic reductions and an end to using micro plastics in cosmetics. The agency received an Avaaz petition bearing 1,000,000 signatures touting a ban on single use plastics by 2022.

Australian trailblazer mourned

Litter prevention expert and psychologist Karen Curnow, the co-author of the seminal book "Litter-ology", died suddenly June 8 at the age of 57 in Melbourne. She is survived by husband/writing partner Rob and sons, Fletcher and Lindsay. The family plans to establish a scholarship in Karen's name to honour her environmental legacy. No bag bans allowed here

A law proposed in Pennsylvania to negate any attempts across the state to ban or tax recyclable plastic bags passed in the Senate on Wednesday, but Governor Tom Wolf, a bill opponent, could still use his power to veto it.

New Zealand in the game

A tidy sum of \$1.7-million is being invested in New Zealand's coordinated national effort to cultivate awareness about tidiness. "Litter Less, Recycle More" will be the umbrella for the government's "Love NZ" and "Be A Tidy Kiwi" brands and will dovetail with the preexisting "Do the Right Thing" program from Keep New Zealand Beautiful. Packaging Forum is a partner and will install new bins while promoting the recycling of soft plastics.

Every year, more than 8 million tons of plastic end up in seas and rivers, causing 8 billion dollars in damages. So far, 20 countries have signed on with the United Nations Environment to help change this.

Inmates won't be litter picking much longer (6/11) North Carolina will soon end its long held practice of using prison inmates to pick up roadside litter. A report found that a private contractor can do the job cheaper. Sixty hours of community service in Texas (6/9) The "Don't Mess With Texas" state is proposing a new tool in a judge's arsenal for dealing with those found guilty of littering: up to 60 hours of community service picking up litter or working in a recycling centre. If passed, the law could take effect September 1. "Nip litter" - tiny bottles, big problem (6/8) On June 13 a joint committee in Massachusetts held a public hearing to consider Republican State Rep. Randy Hunt's bill to place a redeemable 5-cent deposit on miniature liquor bottles, "nips", a growing litter type. Young women excelling in the wrong area (6/13) In the science behind the new state litter campaign, Nobody Trashes Tennessee, statistics revealed that 71 percent of females ages 16-34 self-identified as litterers, the highest of any demographic group. Men 16-34 described themselves as litterers 64 percent of the time. Jamaican PM publicly decries littering (6/14) Calling it a "cultural problem", Jamaican Prime Minister Andrew Holness made a public plea for littering to stop.
