A mom in Bradford, UK found out the hard way that even crumbs from a sausage roll can get you a ticket. On their way to a bin to dispose of their food wrappers, her children, 3 and 5, were scattering flakes of baked goods to feed the pigeons. City enforcement officers handed the mother a notice to pay £80 for littering or fight the fine in court.



Sample Resolutions for 2018

- Stop using plastic straws.
- Use recyclable or reusable cutlery.
- Switch to reusable bags and coffee cups.
- Purchase bulk foods in reusable containers you bring from home to replace single-use plastic bags and twist ties.
- Instead of bottled water, use a personal, refillable water bottle.
- Recycle properly by learning all the rules and following them.
- Pick up litter.
- Keep a litter bag in your car or handbag.
- Stop spitting gum on the ground -- wrap and save it for the next available bin.
- Smokers: quit littering - use a container or just quit smoking.
