South Africa's WRAPP steps up

Waste removal and recycling company WRAPP is sponsoring the Kiickbutt initiative to demonstrate the magnitude of the damage caused by the irresponsible discarding of cigarette butts.

"As you walk along the beach or take a hike anywhere in the country this festive season you will find cigarette butts scattered all over the place, defacing the natural beauty of your surroundings," says WRAPP CEO Clive Amsel.

The company has fabricated giant cigarette butts out of decommissioned telephone poles and is setting them up strategically in places where people come to enjoy outdoor leisure activities.

These 'in-your-face' installations have already caused a stir in places like Llandudno beach and Lion's Head in Cape Town. Further locations have been identified by the company for similar installations over the next few months, including Scarborough, Fishhoek, Platteklip Gorge, Umhlanga, and the Cederberg mountains.

WRAPP stands for Waste Recycling Application, an app that connects entrepreneur truck owners directly with waste removal customers, enabling bookings to be confirmed in a few seconds.
